

LCC VISUAL ARTIST SPOTLIGHT: JOSE VARGAS

Mexican American visual artist Jose Vargas has been creating work for over forty years. He has been pivotal as a mentor to several generations of Latina/o artists in Dallas and the greater North Texas region. He has worked extensively with the Office of Arts & Culture's cultural centers as a curator, installer, and, most importantly, visual arts advisor for exhibitions. He was also the gallery coordinator at the Ice House Cultural



Center, the pioneering cultural space in Oak Cliff in the late 1990s and 2000s run by the Office of Arts & Culture. In 2019, his retrospective Retro-Matico 2: The Works of Jose Vargas was held at the Latino Cultural Center. Retro-Matico 2 grew out of an exhibit at the Oak Cliff Cultural Center aptly titled Retro-Matico. Vargas continues to create new work, exploring different mediums and ideas to address current themes.


ANDREA & CINDY PEDRAZA/COCOANDRE **CHOCOLATIER**
